The Canon writes.....



Dear Parishioners and Friends

As I pen this letter, we are still in the season of Epiphany and as I reflect on the Christmas just passed, I feel for an increasing number of people Christmas seems to involve a great deal of preparation, even anxiety and stress. Then, in the course of one short day, it's all over. There is a huge buildup of expectations and anticipation. For a brief time, human beings are at their best generous, friendly, kind. Then it is back to earth with a thud. Where did Christmas go?

Well, newspaper reports provide one explanation. "Retailers report bumper shopping figures." "New Year sales frenzy into fever pitch." Crowds descending on High Street shops compared to "ants scurrying from beneath an upturned stone." The mad rush was described by one person as "guerrilla shopping" with everyone out for themselves and heaven help the person who gets in the way.

Where did Christmas go? Come to think of it, where did some of the main characters of the Christmas story go? When we look to the Scriptures, we certainly find some indication as to what happened to the original cast after the birth of Jesus.

Where did the Shepherds go? Luke tells us that they returned "glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen." Returned where? No doubt to sheep tending and their normal chores. For a short time, they had shared in the mystery of the Christ Child's birth, but now it was time to get back to work. There were sheep to be tended, pens to be mended, pastures to be found, and lambs to be helped into the world.

The really important question is not where they went but how they went. They returned to their jobs. That's hardly surprising. But they returned glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen. Now there is the difference!

And what about the central figures? Where did they go? Before long, we are told, Mary and Joseph and Jesus became refugees, fleeing from their homeland to Egypt, fearful of Herod's threat to murder young children. Luke tells us that the child Jesus grew in wisdom and years. Later he was to develop a skill in the carpenter's shop at Nazareth. Later still, a brief public ministry of teaching and healing would culminate in conflict, arrest, trial and execution. It was a tough road which began at Bethlehem and ended at Calvary.

The question is - and it is a pertinent question at the beginning of this New Year - Where are you going from Bethlehem? The Shepherds returned to their work-a-day world glorifying and praising God. They knew life could never be the same again because of all the things they had heard and seen. The Holy Family went from Bethlehem into hardship. Unfortunately, Jesus went all the way to Calvary, but with a strength and joy that surpassed any adversity. So maybe it's not just a question of where you are going, but of how you are going and who is going with you.

Wishing you every blessing and fulfilment in 2026.

Saint Columb's Cathedral, Londonderry Wednesday 31st December 2025: New Year's Eve

Janus is the god of beginnings and endings. He is often depicted with a double-faced head; one face looking back and the other face looking forward.

Tonight I feel very much like Janus – as I look back over 70 years of life, as I look back over 46 and a half years of active ministry in The Dioceses of Derry and Raphoe, as I look back to an association with this Cathedral Church that began 48 and a half years ago, as I look back on my membership of 26 and half years as a member of the Cathedral Chapter, and as I look back on the honour of having served as Rector of this Parish and the Dean of Derry for 8 and a half years.

My story begins in the Parish of Mountmellick in County Laois in The Diocese of Kildare. I came from a church loving family. We attended church on every Sunday and for a number of years my mother was a Sunday School teacher.

Ours was a traditional Church of Ireland parish, using the services in The Book of Common Prayer.

Our parish fostered vocations in a quiet way. I can think immediately of five men from the parish who were ordained.

One became a bishop, one became a dean and two became canons.

As a teenager myself and two other parishioners who were ordained sat in close proximity with our families in that parish church.

One particular and significant memory for me was when I was about eight years of age. It was the custom in those days to visit neighbouring churches at Harvest and at Christmas time.

On one occasion along with my parents I attended a church service at Harvest time. I believe that the preacher was the Archbishop of Dublin, Archbishop George Simms. I do not remember his sermon but I do remember what he did when we went to the parish hall for refreshments after the service. He handed round a plate of sandwiches and I went home convinced that this was what I wanted to do with my life.

On that evening I firmly believe that God spoke to me.

For me there were no flashing lights and no fanfare of trumpets, but in a simple action I felt God calling me to serve Him. And that sense of calling has never left me.

On another occasion when I was about ten or eleven years of age my grandfather took me to where he grew up in County Tipperary.

We called to visit an elderly couple, friends of his.

During my time in the home the lady of the house turned to me and in a very confident voice said, **"You are going to be a clergyman"**. I do not believe that my grandfather had mentioned my desire to be ordained to that lady at any time during our visit. She must have had some special gift of perception as her prediction came true some years later.

Another significant moment for me was in March and April 1977.

A number of theological students came to this City and Diocese for Holy Week.

I was fortunate to be placed in Saint Columb's Cathedral where I stayed with The Reverend Terry Doherty in St Columb's Court. I preached here on Palm Sunday and on Maundy Thursday of that week.

During the week the students also visited other churches in the City, including All Saints' Clooney.

In that week I fell in love with this City and I went home knowing clearly that if and when I was ordained I wanted to serve my title in the Parish of Clooney.

In February 1979, on the day before prospective curates met Rectors, Canon John Brown – the Warden of the Divinity Hostel – received a telephone call from the Rector of Clooney, Archdeacon Charles Willoughby, inviting me to become the new Curate of The Parish of Clooney. I didn't have to think twice; I accepted the invitation immediately – and on Sunday 24th June 1979 I was made a deacon in this Cathedral Church to serve as Curate-assistant in the Parish of Clooney.

During the three years that I ministered there I got to know many people and many of them remain friends to this day.

In fact some of them are now members of this parish!

Archdeacon Willoughby and his wife Morwenna spent part of their Summer holidays in Dunfanaghy. The Rector of Dunfanaghy – The Reverend Fred Reilly - had left in 1982 and Archdeacon Willoughby suggested that I should consider becoming Rector.

I well remember meeting the parochial nominators in the old Diocesan Office; one of them was a man named John Merrick! – and I was instituted as Rector in April 1982.

During the five years that I spent there a re-organisation of parishes in part of The Diocese of Raphoe took place and I took on the responsibility for

The Parishes of Gweedore (Bunbeg) with Carrickfin, and Templecrone (Dungloe).

Although I loved the area and the people, a parish of six churches covering a distance of thirty miles with four services every Sunday, made me think about my ministry in this area.

I was approached by a parish in the Midlands to consider putting my name forward for Rector. I was unsure what to do.

When I chatted to Bishop Meheffey he told me that he was meeting with the parochial nominators for the Parish of Castledawson and would I allow my name to be considered.

Well, the rest is history as I was instituted Rector of Castledawson in June 1987 and spent sixteen very happy years there.

My ministry in Castledawson, while it was mostly happy, meant that at times I had to meet some very sad and challenging incidents. One of these occurred in January 1992 when 14 construction workers, returning from their work in Omagh, were set upon at Teebane crossroads near Cookstown.

Seven of the men were killed instantly and the rest were wounded.

The driver of the van (Oswald Gilchrist) – a parishioner of mine – died from his injuries four days later in the Royal Victoria Hospital in Belfast. I was present with his wife when the life support machine was turned off.

Two years after moving to Mid-Ulster Bishop Meheffey appointed me Rural Dean of The Maghera and Kilrea Rural Deanery.

Over the next twenty-eight years I got to know all of the parishes and worked closely, especially during interregnums, with the local parishioners.

In 2003 I was looking after The Parishes of Tamlaght O'Crilly Upper and Lower (Innistrush) near Kilrea and I felt God calling me to pastures new. In May 2003 I was appointed Rector of that group of parishes and I served as Rector there for 14 years.

In the Autumn of 2016, following the installation of Dean William Morton as Dean of Saint Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin, I was invited to consider the post of Rector of The Parish of Templemore. And as is known I was appointed Rector of this Parish and Dean of Derry, being instituted and installed in March 2017.

On that occasion the wheel had turned full circle.

I returned to the City with which I had fallen in love forty years previously – and it is interesting to note that on my first Sunday as Rector and Dean (2nd April 2017) it was one day short of forty years that I had preached from this pulpit for the first time as a young theological student!

Ministry is a very wonderful vocation. What an honour and a privilege to be chosen by God to serve Him!

The words of Jesus ring true – **You did not choose me, but I chose you.**

And I appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit.

I hope and pray that in some small ways people have been helped and encouraged through my ministry. I am always grateful and encouraged when someone comments on one of my sermons and asks for a copy. Very often it is the sermon that I feel was not well prepared that makes the most impact!

Tonight as I retire from the Stipendiary Ministry of The Church of Ireland I find personal comfort in words that I quote at this time every year. As I look to a future that is as yet uncertain – yet full of promise – the words of Louise Haskins strike a chord with me.

I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year,

“Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown”.

And he replied, “Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God.

That shall be to you better than light, and safer than a known way”.

So I went forth, and finding the hand of God, trod gladly into the night.

And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East.

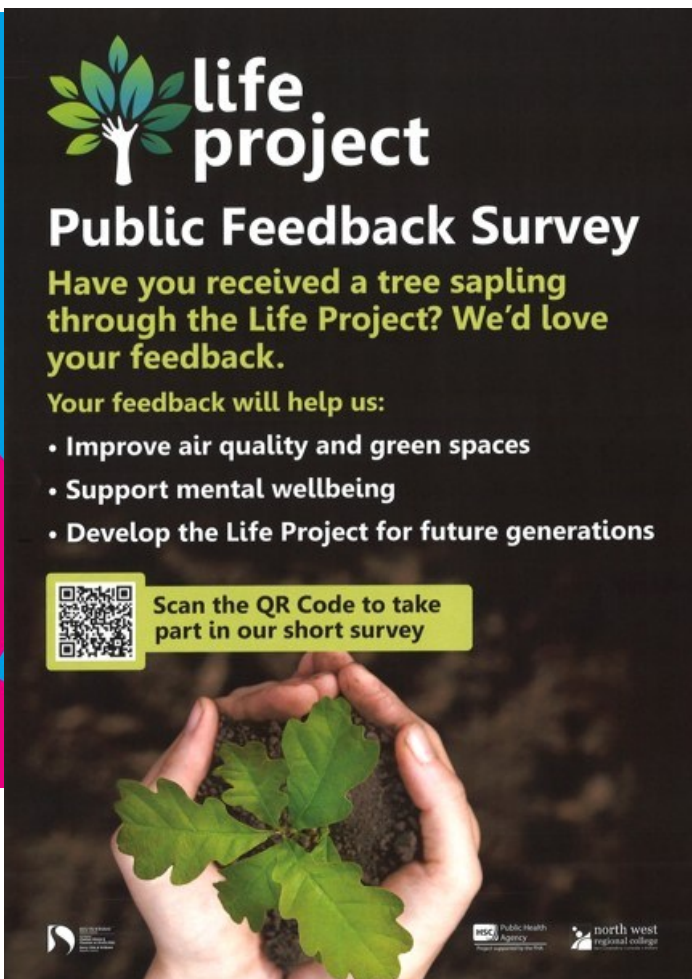

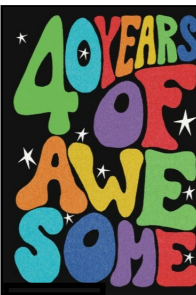

2026 marks the 150th anniversary of Mothers' Union, founded in the parish of Old Alresford by Mary Sumner. Her vision was to bring women

together in faith to support one another and strengthen family life.



From that small beginning, we have grown into a global movement of 4 million members across 84 countries. Guided by Matthew 5:16, our members "let their light shine" by offering non-judgmental care to those in hospitals, families of prisoners, and parents of premature babies. We also work to build resilient communities by speaking out against injustice and hosting parenting support groups.

All of our work is guided by three core pillars:

- **Ending Violence:** Promoting peace and safety.
- **Ending Injustice:** Advancing gender justice.
- **Ending Poverty:** Fostering self-reliance and resilience.



Our global programmes—ranging from literacy and savings groups to domestic abuse awareness—are rooted in local communities. We listen first, then respond with practical, faith-led action through thousands of daily acts of service.

Men and Domestic Abuse

In 2024/25, police recorded 5,747 domestic abuse crimes with a male victim in Northern Ireland, representing one-third of all domestic abuse victims. Despite these figures, only about a fifth of these incidents resulted in a sanction outcome. This highlights that many men still feel unable to report abuse or continue through the criminal justice system.

Help For Men

While the majority of domestic abuse is perpetrated by men against women, men also experience abuse from female partners and in same-sex relationships. The stigma and shame surrounding this issue often create significant barriers for men seeking support.

If you or someone you know is affected, the Domestic & Sexual Violence Helpline, currently operated by NEXUS NI, is available 24 hours a day. They offer emotional support and information for men experiencing domestic abuse and can provide referrals to other helpful agencies. For many, calling this helpline is the vital first step in addressing these challenges.

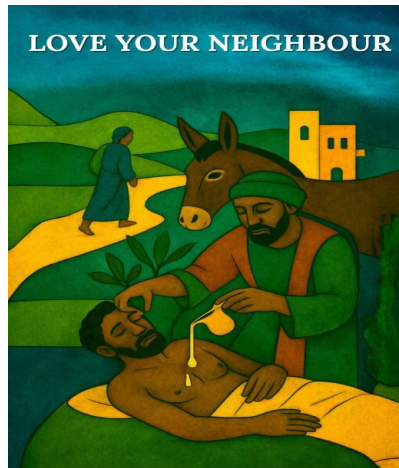

We are very grateful to the wider community who are so generous in their support and their amazing creativity. It is a privilege to meet the community and often to be told “this is my first time in here or, this is part of our Christmas tradition.” As part of our outreach programme, we decided to show some Christmas films on our large screen, and we were pleased at the reaction from those who came. Our thanks go to the Nerve Centre who were so supportive in sorting licenses and bookings. Thank you to those who gave us donations, it is much appreciated. Thank you all from EWG to everybody involved and do have a good rest, it is only 273 days to November and we re-open to visitors on 1st April 2026.

Obituaries

George Winston Carson 12th August 1940 – 27th November 2025

We meet in this family home on this afternoon to remember Winston Carson, to reflect on his life, to thank God for the memories that we have shared and that we cherish, and to support you, Winston's family, with our presence and our prayers. I wish to convey to you Nan and to your family the sincere condolences of myself and of Canon John Merrick and of the members of the church family of Saint Columb's Cathedral.

As we remember you today we also remember Dale and Kathryn, Amanda and Allen, Nicola and Dave; your grandchildren – John, Samantha, Nathan, Jake, Rhiannon, Rhys, Ryan and Cori – and your great grandchildren Riley, Esme, Harvey, Tamera and Blake. The story of Winston's life takes us back 85 years – to 12th August 1940.

That is the day on which he was born – the son of William and Elizabeth Carson of Ferguson Lane in Londonderry.

He was given two names – George Winston. I understand that he was named George after King George V and Winston after Winston Churchill!

Winston was one of five children – his siblings Tilly, Noel, Joe and Robbie have all predeceased him.

Winston began his life as a member of Carlisle Road Presbyterian Church.

His first formal education was as a pupil at First Derry Primary School.

It was on the occasion of his marriage to Nan Moore that he joined the church family of Saint Columb's Cathedral.

I know that there is some confusion about when Winston and Nan were married.

Was it 30th or 31st July?

The Cathedral records say 30th July 1960 and record that the best man was James Campbell, the bridesmaid was Sylvia Stewart and the Officiant was The Very Reverend Leslie Lawrenson.

Nan remembers the day very well. It was quite a hectic day for the Dean and his curate The Reverend Cecil Bradley as three couples were married in Saint Columb's Cathedral during the day. Nan has told me that as soon as one couple was married another couple was entering the Cathedral for their wedding!

Winston and Nan were childhood sweethearts.

Winston lived at 3 Ferguson Lane and Nan lived around the corner at 15 Belview Avenue. Some people may have frowned upon their friendship, romance and marriage because of the fact that they were so young.

But Winston and Nan have proved them to be wrong because their marriage has lasted for just over 65 years.

After their marriage Winston and Nan made their home at Clarence Place in the Fountain Estate and they moved to this home in Lincoln Courts 54 years ago in November 1971.

Today many boys and girls remain in education well into their teenage years.

For Winston his formal education in school ended when he was 14 years of age.

Upon leaving school he gained employment at a number of places.

First at Dr Watson's practice at Dacre Terrace where he was a receptionist.

He then moved to Robert Keys Builders Merchants where he was employed as a lorry driver. He was a first class driver – Class 1 HGV – entering and winning many competitions.

He later was promoted to Transport Manager for the Company.

Having completed 31 years working for Robert Keys Winston's career changed when he became a school bus driver for children with special needs.

He loved his new job. He loved the children and they loved him and showed that love especially at Christmas time when Winston would be the recipient of many cards and presents.

Winston retired at the age of 65 years, but it was only last year at the age of 84 years that he ceased from driving with the proud record of an unblemished driving record. As well as the jobs that I have mentioned Winston also was employed as a Bouncer in the Embassy Ballroom on the Strand Road in the 1960's.

(I am informed that he was very good at his job).
He also was a Corporal with the Territorial Army (The North Irish Horse Regiment).
Winston and Nan were a wonderful example of a married couple.
Their relationship of husband and wife for just over 65 years was one of love, commitment, devotion and sacrifice.
I'm sure that they faced some challenging times in their lives but they faced them together.
Winston's family is so grateful for a loving father and grandfather who loved all of his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren equally.
And they will all miss his interest and presence in their lives.
On Thursday afternoon while I was visiting this home to prepare for this Service I invited Nan and her family to share with me some funny event in Winston's life.
It could be something that happened years ago or something that happened in more recent weeks.
Well, they have shared with me something that happened recently while Winston was a patient in Altnagelvin Hospital.
And could I just say here that Nan and her family appreciate the care that was given to Winston over the past weeks. He was in a ward by himself but very close to the Nurses' Station. And the nurses attended to his needs with care and compassion. The needs of his family were not forgotten either.
They also received support from the nursing staff for which they are very grateful.
Now to get back to this event.
At this time Winston had an infection and it caused him to see things that were not there; to say things that seemed plausible but were not true; and to act in ways that were totally out of character.
On one particular day a young junior doctor came to Winston's room to take some blood. When she inserted the needle in his arm Winston pretended to be dead and so convincing was he that the young doctor dropped the tray and went to get some assistance.
Nan had to convince her that 'he was taking the hand at her' – an expression that only added to her confusion and distress!
I'm sure that there have been other funny events that will emerge at a later time but this one shows that there was a light-hearted side to Winston.
And, perhaps, that is one of the reasons why people warmed to him.
He did not take life, or himself, too seriously.
The death of a loved member of a family, whether it is sudden and unexpected or after many weeks and months of ill-health, brings a new situation to a family and to their home. This is so for you who mourn for Winston today.
Your lives have been focused on him and his needs for many weeks.
You have spent many hours, days, and weeks in Altnagelvin Hospital.
Those were precious times for you because, although Winston was very ill, you were able to spend time with him.
Now life has changed. The visits to Altnagelvin Hospital have ceased because Winston is not there.
It may be that, in time, visits to Ballyoan Cemetery will become more frequent.
But always remember that Winston is not there either.
Our Christian faith convinces us that today Winston is in Heaven.
In the place that Jesus has prepared for him.
In the place where one day you and I will be.
Hold that thought close to you. Find reassurance in the belief that one day you and Winston will be re-united and that you will find joy and peace again.

Andrew (Andy) McCorkell
4th August 1940 - 25th December 2025

We meet this afternoon to remember and to pay tribute to Andy McCorkell, to thank God for his life, to recall how his life touched our lives in different ways and at different times – and to uphold in prayer the members of his family.

Let me begin by expressing the sympathy of myself, of Canon John Merrick, and of the members of The Parish of Templemore to you Lisa and to Andy's surviving sibling George. We also remember the families of Andy's other siblings – all of whom are now deceased – Sally, Betty, Sammy and Carol.

I asked Lisa to prepare some details of Andy's life that I could include in a Tribute.

What Lisa gave me was a wonderful Tribute in itself so I will read it as I have received it – and add some personal comments at the end.

Andy was born on 4th August 1940 to Sadie and Samuel McCorkell at Meenagh Hill, Bready. He was the eldest of six children and always took on the role of big brother seriously and this protective nature stayed with him for life. He always saw it as his duty to be there for his siblings for whatever they needed, whenever they needed it. I know that George, Sally, Betty, Sammy and Carol all looked up to him throughout their lives.

Andy often spoke with love about his childhood and family was always at the centre of every memory. These early years and family experiences really instilled a devotion to family and he lived his life with family as priority and of great importance.

One memory that always makes Lisa smile is the tale of Andy trying to be helpful.

He overheard his parents speak about rats on the farm at Meenagh Hill and so, unknown to them, Andy took himself outside, found a spade before coming back in to declare, **"All done Mummy. The rats are dead"**.

However, when they went outside they discovered that the rats were actually baby chicks and that his actions were less than helpful!

The McCorkell family then moved to Clarence Place in the Fountain and then to Northland Way where they called **'home'**.

Andy went to First Derry Primary School where he excelled in his studies. Despite having the grades to progress to Grammar School, his mother had four job options lined up for him instead.

When he left school Andy worked at Ebrington Factory for a number of years before getting a job as a Fitter's Mate at Coolkeeragh Power Station. It was here that he met many people whom he would consider good friends throughout his life.

Andy grew up in a Christian household and the family were regular and devoted members of Saint Columb's Cathedral.

Here, Andy took part in the Sunday School and Scouts and had a very brief stint in the Boys' Choir before being told to mime!

Church life and his Christian faith would continue to be important to Andy through his whole life.

He married Kathleen Campbell at Ballyarnett Presbyterian Church on 8th September 1979 and the couple then started to attend Saint Columb's Cathedral together.

Andy rarely missed a Sunday Service until Covid lockdowns and then afterwards he was delighted to get back out to church where he would attend until his Alzheimer's diagnosis didn't let him. Faith and prayer were fundamental parts of Andy's day and as a family he and Kathleen would instil bedtime prayers as routine with themselves and Lisa.

Even during the last week he still liked to say 'The Lord's Prayer' before bed and was delighted to be offered Holy Communion or visits from Dean Stewart and Canon John.

Children have always been special to Andy.

He was devoted to his nephews and nieces and loved taking them to places and buying them treats. He was delighted to become a father himself when Lisa was born in April 1984.

He devoted himself to this role and would do anything and everything to make sure that she had what she needed.

Lisa has lots of childhood memories of the two of them sneaking off for ice cream, going to the library for new books and making up the most amazing bedtime stories.

In later years Andy was delighted when his great nephew Brandon was born and the two of them had the most special bond.

Andy loved nothing more than playing with him, reading him stories or building snowmen. When Molly and Finn came along they lit up his world too.

When they would visit him in the care homes a special smile would be seen and everyone could tell how delighted he was to see them!

When any children visited Andy's care home he was just delighted and a special event for him was recently when Lisa was able to bring the children from her P1 class to visit, sing and deliver Christmas cards he was the centre of attention on that day!

Andy loved music so much so that Kathleen would often say that they had to hide beer mats and bottles on nights out to stop him from drumming!

Andy often spoke of the dances at the Memorial Hall and it was during one of those dances that he met his beloved Kathleen.

They would have many tales of nights out at dances and dinner dances with their good friends Barney and Liz.

There would always be music playing in the car where Phil Coulter was a firm favourite. Andy loved getting to a concert and the Abba Tribute in the Odyssey brought lots of singing and dancing.

After the Alzheimer's diagnosis, music remained an important part of Andy's daily life.

He just loved it when Gina G came to sing at Oakleaves. The music of Andre Reiu was the music that calmed him and Elvis got the hips swinging.

He even discovered new music too and singing the chorus of Applejack became his party piece!

From an early age Andy loved to travel and he enjoyed holidays to Portugal, Yugoslavia and Gibraltar. He also loved family holidays, especially his trips on the boat with his sister Sally and her husband Mick. Andy, Kathleen and Lisa also spent many happy Summers in Portrush where they stayed with Kathleen's brother Sammy and his wife Anna.

Sport was also a massive part of who Andy was.

He was a huge football fan and played for Institute Football Club in his youth before continuing to support them and attending most of their matches.

This support never went and even during a recent stay in hospital he requested to watch a Stute match on Lisa's computer.

In his early years Andy also played darts and table tennis and through friends in Coolkeeragh he also took up golf.

His proud achievement was winning a golf trophy the day after he found out that Kathleen was expecting Lisa.

Andy's love of sport developed his friendships further and we would often joke that he had to be out at church early on a Sunday so that he could relive the Saturday football match and his daily walk to Longs Supermarket for the newspaper could take over an hour by the time that he met people and chatted about sport!

Andy received a devastating diagnosis of Alzheimer's Disease in 2023 and for a few years before this he had lost lots of his independence. He moved to Oakleaves Care Home in August 2024 and the care that he received here was outstanding.

This felt like home to him and the staff here were able to give him back some of his independence through music, games and shopping. He loved to wave and chat to all of the staffand was always delighted to get the sneaky ice creams at night.

As a family we will be forever grateful for the love and care that he was shown to make his final year so happy and calm.

Andy was one in a million and a hero to many.

He will be sorely missed by all who knew him and he will be fondly and lovingly remembered for his unconditional love and kindness to everyone.

In this wonderful tribute penned by Lisa we have been allowed to see a man who loved life; a man who thrived on family relationships and friendships; a man who enjoyed music, singing and dancing.

I see Andy as a colourful character; someone who enjoyed the bright things of life.

On Christmas Eve when I visited him in Altnagelvin Hospital he was dressed in a colourful Christmas pyjama top, red with a Christmas motif.

We see this trend also in the photograph on the front page of the Order of Service.

I believe that Andy would just love and appreciate all of the lights and decorations in this Cathedral Church today.

As we see the lights in this church, in our city and towns, and in our homes we begin to appreciate that light is something that we need. The days are still mostly dark but soon more hours of sunshine will prevail.

At this time of the year the Church's Liturgy has been reminding us that Jesus Christ is the Light of the World.

He came and still comes to dispel darkness – and the death of a loved member of our family is always a dark period in our lives.

It is evident from what we have heard today that faith was one of the important aspects of the life of Andy, Kathleen and Lisa.

Today, continue to hold onto the aspect of faith.

Keep looking to the light and hope that Jesus gives.

It will carry you through dark, sad days to a time when the future will become much brighter and hopeful.
