# The Dean *Dear Parishioners and Friends*



In the Church Calendar there are days that are called writes 🥒 'saints' days'. On these days the Church remembers in particular men and women in whom Christ-like characteristics

and gualities have been seen.

Some of the saints whom the Church remembers are those whose names are found in the Bible, eg. Paul, Peter, Andrew, Luke, Matthew. Others have a connection with a particular country or district, eg. Patrick, Brigid, Columba.

The feastday of Saint Columba falls on 9<sup>th</sup> June. Columba is the patron saint of the Dioceses of Derry and Raphoe and is fondly remembered throughout the Church.

Columba, whose name means dove, was born to Fedlimid and Eithne at Gartan in County Donegal on 7<sup>th</sup> December 521. On his father's side he was the great great grandson of Niall of the Nine Hostages, an Irish high king of the 5<sup>th</sup> century.

He was baptised at Temple-Douglas in the present day Parish of Conwal (Letterkenny) by his teacher and foster uncle Saint Crunathan.

At an early age Columba heard the call of God and he received his education at the monastic school at Movilla near Newtownards.

When he was ordained he travelled to other parts of the country but the monastic settlement that he founded at Derry (the place of the oak tree) is the place most associated with him. In 560 Columba had a guarrel with Saint Finnian of Movilla Abbey. Columba had borrowed a psalter and had copied it intending to keep it for himself. This angered Finnian and the dispute led to a vicious battle near Sligo in which many men were killed. A resolution to the dispute was found when Columba agreed to go into exile and to leave Ireland and to win for Christ as many souls as had died in battle.

In 563 Columba and 12 of his companions sailed by boat (a curragh) from Lough Foyle in Derry to Scotland.

They settled eventually at Iona where Columba founded an abbey as the base for spreading Christianity among the northern Pictish kingdoms that were pagan. Columba died on the island of Iona on 9<sup>th</sup> June 597.

What lessons can we draw from the life of Columba?

#### Columba was called by God to serve Him.

This is true for all of us too – men and women, boys and girls, young and old, rich and poor. God calls us to serve Him.

Columba was called to serve at first in Ireland and later in Scotland but our place of service may be much closer to our own homes and we may be called to 'preach the Gospel' in our own homes by our actions and by our words.

#### Columba was human; he made mistakes.

This is true for us too. None of us is perfect. We have and we do make mistakes and, sometimes, we have to pay a costly price for those actions, but God still loves us and He can still use us in a wonderful way just as He used Saint Columba.

O use me, Lord, use even me, just as you will, and when, and where; until at last your face I see, your rest, your joy, your glory share. (Hymn 589).

Well Folks

I hope you are all keeping safe during this stressful time. We are working away in the community distributing creative packs to young people containing puzzles, books, Games, Treats and Healthy Snacks. All of which have been well received.

Each week we also distribute Eat Well Live Well boxes to the young Primary school kids to ensure that they get good nourishing food.

Teenagers also receive Self Care Packs supporting them regarding their personal hygiene. Families and older people receive food parcels containing treats, books, home baked assorted tray bakes, and cleaning materials. We try to ensure during the Covid-19 Lockdown that no one will suffer hardship.

This has proved to be an enormous amount of work but to see the smiles on the kids' faces when the goodies arrive makes it all worthwhile.

To date we have delivered 595 boxes/packs. This would not have been possible without the support of staff and volunteers in the youth club.

At the moment we are making Protective Face masks which we will distribute to families as listening to the news we will need them regarding using public transport at a later date. I am also knitting dish cloths which I am selling for £3.00 each, so if anyone would like to order please contact me. To date I have sold 38 and the money will go to The Palliative Care

Team Foyle Hospice.

Well the good news is that it looks like work will start soon regarding the refurbishment and extension of our Youth Centre, so at least that is something to look forward to.

Please take care and focus on one day at a time. I find it helps. Keep Safe!


At the moment, everybody is, understandably, very preoccupied with the Covid-19 pandemic. However, we should not forget that there are other serious diseases afflicting people. The very important work of the Leprosy Mission still goes on, but there has been a massive drop in their funding.

It is very worthwhile work as most of the people who contract leprosy are very poor and often have little education, so it is vital that they learn that with relatively inexpensive treatment, the disease is completely curable and the sooner anyone with symptoms comes forward for treatment, the less serious the long-term damage will be.

At this time we should pray for Rebecca Parnell, the TLM representative who came to speak to us at Saint Columb's Cathedral in January and the other staff at the office in Lisburn. We should also remember in our prayers the TLM staff working in very difficult conditions overseas, often at great personal sacrifice, to bring healing and comfort to people afflicted by this awful, but curable disease.

I hope you have continued to put money in your TLM box. It really mounts up! It looks as if we may not be worshiping in the Cathedral for some time. I would therefore be happy to collect boxes from your homes. Please telephone me on 71342914 to advise me of your address. If you want to be extra-careful, I can arrange to collect the box at a set time and you can leave the box in a bag on the doorstep. The Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, the Right Reverend Andrew Forster, joined scores of parishioners from Saint Augustine's Church and further afield for a 'Drive—in Service' in the centre of Londonderry on Sunday morning to mark Pentecost Sunday. The service, which took place in glorious sunshine, was led by the Rector of Saint Augustine's – 'The Wee Church on the Walls' – the Reverend Nigel Cairns.

The service was held in Bishop Street car park, adjoining Saint Augustine's Parish Hall and opposite the city's courthouse. A team of volunteers, dressed in 'high–vis' vests and PPE gear, oversaw a one–way, 'car ferry' type system, that meant cars were directed in one entrance and out by a different route after the service.

Social–distancing guidelines required all those present to remain in their cars during worship, and parish volunteers ensured that none of the worshippers fell victim to the soaring temperature.

Bishop Andrew, who preached the sermon, welcomed the congregation to what he called his 'back garden' (the car park occupies what would previously have been the back garden of the old Bishop's Palace). He said, Saint Augustine's was known as 'the Wee Church on the Walls'. "Today, we're the wee church without walls," he said. "I always think about Saint Augustine's as the wee Church with a big heart and today we're showing our big heart because we're together, worshipping God on this Pentecost Sunday.

"This is definitely a first for me," the Bishop said, "and I would imagine it's a first for many of you as well, but God is here and we worship him in spirit and in truth."

The Reverend Cairns echoed Bishop Forster's welcome to the first 'Drivethrough Church' in the inner city, and thanked all those who had helped make the service possible. He said the Saint Augustine's parishioners would be gathering for worship in the same location again next Sunday.





Ordination Anniversaries


