



Dear Parishioners and Friends

Dean Cecil Orr, the first anniversary of whose death we remember this month (11th November), wrote about two of his teachers at Foyle.

I entered Foyle in 1946. The headmaster, WAC McConnell, encouraged me in reading the Bible at assembly.

I was a member of the Intermediate relay team in 1949, which were Ulster School Champions. Our coach was RJ Macartney, a Cambridge blue, who introduced us to starting blocks, an innovation at that time.

Another encourager! Encouragement goes a long way.

In my Tribute / Address at Dean Cecil's funeral on Tuesday 15th November 2022 I said, I know that there are clergy serving in The Church of Ireland today because they were encouraged by Cecil. He noticed something in them and spoke at precisely the right moment.

We often associate Barnabas with the gift of encouragement but I believe that Andrew, whose feast day we observe on 30th November, also was an encourager.

There are three passages of Scripture that tell us about a significant contribution that Andrew made in the life of people.

He brought his brother, Peter, to Jesus. (Saint John 1: 40-42).

He 'discovered' the young boy with the loaves and fishes. (Saint John 6: 8-9).

He introduced the Greek pilgrims to Jesus. (Saint John 12: 20-22).

We often hear it said, 'Christianity is taught', and it is true that Sunday Schools, Confirmation classes and attendance at church services do have a significant role to play in informing children, young people and adults about the Bible. But, I believe — and there is evidence to support this view — that Christianity can also be caught. This has happened so often through the actions and encouragement of an individual.

We may not remember the words that someone has spoken but his/her actions can often inspire and challenge us.

Someone has said that more people are brought to Jesus, not through sermon preaching or evangelical crusades, but through a personal contact with another Christian. I am not denying that when the Bible is taught well a person's faith can be ignited. He/she can appreciate that what Jesus did on the Cross was for him/her and can be led to embrace the Christian Faith for him/herself.

But the words, the example, the encouragement of someone who knows not only the Word of God but also the Person of God can also have a life-transforming effect. Do you consider yourself to be 'an encourager'? Do you use your words and actions to introduce a member of your family or a friend to Jesus and to the Christian Way of life? Who is the person or persons in your life who have encouraged you? And will you make it a priority in your life to encourage another person not only in their Christian walk with God but also in all of the activities of their daily lives?

HARVEST 2023 - 'GOING HOME'


Harvest Sunday was celebrated on Sunday 1st October 2023.

MISSION FOCUS – THE BIBLE SOCIETY IN MALAWI

The local Church informed The Bible Society of Malawi that many families were struggling to read God's Word together. This problem was especially serious in rural areas where families simply did not have enough money to purchase their own copy of the Bible. The Bible Society of Malawi partnered with the local Church and Scripture Union to produce 'Family Scripture Engagement' packs. Each of them includes a Bible, a Children's Bible and a Bible Reading Guide. This project has been life changing for families – they are able to read the Bible together, understand it and grow in their faith. Over 1,000 homes – most of whom live in extreme poverty – have been impacted by this project to date. The programme was especially vital over the last few years as stay-at-home restrictions prevented families from attending church together. Without their own access to Scripture these families would have been cut off. Nevertheless, it remains a much-needed resource today.

Hazel Hamilton 21st July 1941 – 1st October 2023

Many of us gathered in this room just over four years ago; on Tuesday 27th August 2019. We had gathered here to give thanks to God for the life of Billy Hamilton and to support Hazel and the members of the family by our presence and with our prayers.

Today, we meet again in this room – this time to give thanks to God for the life of Hazel and to support you, the members of her family, by our presence and with our prayers. Hazel was born, just over 82 years ago, on 21st July 1941.

She was the third of nine children born to Samuel and Annie Elizabeth Wray of Victoria Street. Her siblings were Mary, William, George, Samuel, Victor and John.

Two other children died in infancy.

Hazel began her primary education at the Primary School in Bennett Street. Her early Christian formation was at The Salvation Army where she worshipped until she married Billy. She, then, joined the Church of Ireland and The Parish of Templemore.

Billy and Hazel met when they were young teenagers and they were married in Saint Columb's Cathedral on 2nd June 1959 by The Reverend Noel Moore when they were both only 17 years old.

When Billy died four years ago, they had celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. Billy and Hazel were the parents of four children – Stephanie, Derren, Ryan and Gavin; grandparents to eighteen grandchildren and great-grandparents to two great-grandchildren. Hazel, like many young girls of the time, found employment

in the local shirt factories. She worked for some time at Welch Margetson, later moving to Ebrington Factory.

She also worked at the Housing Executive and at the old City Hotel.

Married life began in Bishop Street, but at the beginning

of 'The Troubles' Billy and Hazel moved in 1972 to the Waterside – living in Lincoln Courts and Rossdowney Park where Hazel devoted her time and energy to being a full time mum, looking after her husband and children.

Apart from her domestic duties, Hazel found time to enjoy a number of hobbies and interests. She was a keen and excellent knitter of Aran jumpers, and these were quickly dispatched to Australia and other parts of the world.

Hazel had a phobia of birds and to overcome it she began to breed budgies.

She also loved dogs, breeding German Shepherds.

Hazel's family remembers her in many different ways but one thing that stands out for you is Hazel's love of animals.

You may be aware that the patron saint of animals is Saint Francis of Assisi, and it so happens that tomorrow, 4th October, is his feast day. He died in Assisi, Italy on 3rd October 1226. Today, we have shared memories of Hazel, and I hope that these memories will help you as you adjust to life without one whom you loved and cared for in the eventide of her life. Hazel will not be with you in person but her spirit lives on and in different ways you will feel her presence with you.

Her voice, her words, her smile, her laugh – all of these things will encourage you. Until that glorious day when you will meet her again and be re-united with those who have gone before.

Jesus has promised us a place in Heaven and, in faith, we believe that that is where Hazel is now. In time, we who believe in Jesus, in His promises, and who have committed ourselves to Him, will be welcomed into that place where pain and suffering, hunger and thirst, even death itself, are unknown and where everyone is safe because they are guarded by Jesus Himself.

That is, we trust, what Hazel is now experiencing and enjoying.

Joan Hamilton 30th January 1939 – 22nd October 2023

We have come here today as family members and friends of Joan Hamilton to thank God for her and to remember her – not only as the person whom illness forced her to become – but also as the person who throughout most of her life was a stalwart member of our Cathedral community – a regular member at worship, an active supporter of many activities, a person whose kindness towards others has been recognised and appreciated.

We remember Joan as the beloved wife of Russell; the loving mother of Anne and Graeme; and the cherished grandmother of Lauren, Dylan and Erin.

To you, (and to Joanne, and to Mona and Tom in America), I express our sympathy and assure you of our prayers in this time of sadness and grief.

Joan was born on 30th January 1939, the youngest of four children born to John and Mary Quigley of 3 Windmill Terrace, Londonderry. Her siblings were Harriet, Armour and Jim. Joan was baptised in Saint Columb's Cathedral on 15th March 1939 by The Reverend Louis Crooks, the Curate-assistant.

Her early Christian formation was at the Cathedral where she attended Sunday School, where she was confirmed, and where she was a member of the Uniformed Organisations. Her early primary education was at the Cathedral Schools.

On leaving school Joan was successful in obtaining employment as a part-time Secretary at T S Magee and Son, Building Society, at Castle Street. This remained her one and only place of employment for the rest of her working life.

Joan married Russell Hamilton in Saint Columb's Cathedral on 17th March 1966.

The witnesses being Raymond Hamilton and Gwendoline Price.

The Service of Holy Matrimony was conducted by Dean Leslie Lawrenson.

Joan and Russell began their married life at 1 Clooney Road, Londonderry – and this house remained their home for 54 years.

Joan and Russell were blessed with two children, Anne and Graeme, and as Joan was employed as a part-time Secretary this meant that she was able to be at home when Anne and Graeme were growing up and when they came home from school.

The death of Russell in 2002 left a great emptiness in Joan's life but she quickly began to re-organise her life.

With her children now grown-up and living in England Joan began to form and re-form friendships with people in many different activities.

She played an active part in the life of Saint Columb's Cathedral; as a member of The Widows' Group and The Ladies Choir.

On Tuesday mornings Joan would be found in the Cathedral, joining with other parishioners for the Tuesday morning Service of Holy Communion and later enjoying a chat with her friends over a cup of tea or coffee.

For many years she was a faithful supporter of the annual Christmas Coffee Morning and Sale, an active helper on one of the stalls.

Outside of Cathedral life Joan was a member of The Women's Institute, and she particularly enjoyed the annual trips to many parts of Europe.

Over the past years Joan began to experience ill health in the form of loss of memory. With regular care it was possible for her to remain at home but about three years ago - at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic – it became more difficult for Joan to remain at home. She needed more care and she received this as a resident at Rush Hall Care Home near Limavady. This has been her home for just over three years. Here she was cared for and loved by the members of the nursing staff. Here her bedroom displayed many signs of her family life and on those occasions when I visited her my eyes were drawn to a cushion with the photo of one of her grandchildren on it.

Unable to communicate and to have a conversation with me, I never sensed that Joan was ill at ease. She was simply living her life in a world of her own.

As the son of a parent who suffered from dementia I have seen the effects of this illness – and I know that it can rob a family of the person whom they love. The sufferer loses his or her personality and is not the mother or father, son or daughter whom we remember as we were growing up.

The sufferer lives in his and her own little world, communicating not through words but often through contact. Sometimes a glimpse of something from the past is seen, but it is important to continue to love the person even if they do not recognise us – or we them.

Some years ago, in one of my former parishes, I conducted the funeral service for a lady who suffered from dementia.

On the back of the Order of Service the family had printed a poem. Let me share it with you today.



For some people death is seen simply as an end; the end of an earthly life, the end of relationships. For those of a Christian disposition death is NOT an end but, rather, the continuation of this life in another place and setting.

At death, life does not end. It is changed and we become new people who now live in the presence of God, safe from the troubles and trials of life on earth and free from the weaknesses of human nature.

It is our belief that today Joan Hamilton is free from the weaknesses of human nature and that she is safe in the presence of God.

We are sad because a person whom we loved has gone from us –

but let us be confident in the Christian hope that one day we will meet again.

So today, it is not Farewell or Goodbye but, rather, Goodnight Joan.

May you rest in peace and rise in glory.
