those who served in two World Wars and in subsequent conflicts, and those who serve their King and Country today in distant parts of the world.

In our personal lives we pause to recall those whom we knew and loved – those 'who once were comrades of our way'. It is, perhaps, a member of our family; a friend from school; a colleague from work; a member of our church or community – someone who walked with us and shared some of life's experiences with us that we most remember. That was the legacy that they left us. What legacy are you and I going to leave behind us? When the day comes that you and I have to leave this place and time, what are the memories that our family and friends will have of us? What words will they recall? What actions made the greatest impact on their lives?

As we spend whatever time is left to us here on earth let us do so in such a way that in time to come our family and friends can remember us and say with complete honesty.

"I thank my God every time I remember you".

I expect to pass through this world but once; any good thing, therefore, that I can do, or any kindness that I can show to any fellow-creature, let me do it now; let me not defer or neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again.

A TRIBUTE TO DR MARTIN NEARY 28th March 1940 – 27th September 2025

I am grateful to Dean Raymond Stewart for inviting me to write a few words as a tribute to the late Dr. Martin Neary in the November 2025 edition of the Saint Columb's Cathedral Magazine. Before I do so, I would like to extend my warmest wishes to everyone at Saint Columb's Cathedral. I cherished every moment of my time there and I look back with fondness on my ministry at Saint Columb's.

Martin Neary was a former Organist and Master of the Choristers at Westminster Abbey. I will remember him with great admiration and affection, recalling the many cherished moments we shared both within the Deanery of Saint Columb's and in the Cathedral itself. Martin was an organist and choir director of immense ability with limitless experience and immense insight into the choral tradition of the Anglican Church.

During my time as Dean, I had the privilege of inviting Martin to Saint Columb's on two separate occasions. Each visit was a source of inspiration, as he offered fascinating insights and conducted workshops with the Boy Choristers during their weekly rehearsals. I vividly remember Martin asking the choristers to participate in a memorable activity: he held a candle at a safe distance from each chorister's mouth and asked them to sing a phrase. If they could sing without blowing out the candle, it demonstrated that they had control over their breath and could produce a clear, breathless tone - an impressive and instructive exercise.

Martin also gave superb organ recitals. I know our son, Nicky, often remembers the times he was privileged to work closely with Martin, turning pages during those performances of challenging works by Bach, Buxtehude, and Franck. Martin's artistry and expertise have rightfully earned him a reputation as one of the most highly regarded organists in the UK and Ireland.

I enjoyed many conversations with Martin in the Deanery, where he would stay during his visits. Over late-night refreshments, he would share stories of his experiences at Westminster Abbey, speaking with warmth and humility. His influence at Saint Columb's was huge; he made such an impression on Ian Mills, the then-organist at Derry Cathedral, and the choir there. Together, we recorded a CD based on the works of Mrs. Cecil Frances Alexander, titled "All Things Bright and Beautiful." It was Martin's professional guidance and insight that ensured the success of this project.

Martin Neary's legacy is profound. He has left a lasting impact on Saint Columb's, Westminster Abbey, and the wider musical community. His family, of course, will feel his absence most deeply. I extend my heartfelt condolences to them and continue to keep him in my prayers at Saint Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin.

The day also launches **16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence.**

Purpose:

To end violence against women and girls by engaging men and boys, women and girls as allies in challenging harmful cultural norms and behaviours.

Symbolism:

Wearing a white ribbon symbolizes a commitment to non-violence and a pledge to be part of the solution.

Activities:

Events include educational workshops, church services, and campaigns to promote healthy relationships and challenge gender stereotypes.

Ministry to people with visual impairments and disabilities has always been close to the hearts of those at the Ceylon Bible Society.

This is why the Bible Society is producing the Bible in braille and audio formats. Once complete, the team will distribute the books to Blind Schools, homes, and churches. As the braille Bible is big in size and hard to carry, the Bible Society is finding that most blind individuals are requesting the Bible in an audio format so that they can listen to it anywhere. Unfortunately, the current audio recordings are of an old translation of the Bible, and are also incomplete, making it hard for the visually impaired people to fully understand what the Bible is saying.

This has led to the Bible Society working to record new audio of an up-to-date translation of the full Bible to distribute.

We are looking forward to starting it but by 31 December we will probably be wishing we had never started it. We feel it will make a lovely wall-hanging that we can all be proud of and which future generations will probably treasure more than us. So what are you going to do? (Please let us know). Meanwhile the MU Book Committee will finish the History of Templemore Mothers' Union. It looks like some of us will have to cancel Christmas!!

SOUP LUNCH



Obituary

Valerie Kathleen Brown 14th February 1946 – 23rd October 2025

Between the years 1979 and 1982 I served as Curate-assistant in The Parish of Clooney in this City. Among the many hundreds of families who 'belonged' to this parish, who worshipped in All Saints' Church, and who supported the church both financially and in many other ways was a young family named Brown.

Maurice and Val lived at Shearwater Way along with their daughter Lisa and son Philip. As the years passed and I moved on to other parishes I lost touch with Maurice and Val, so imagine my surprise and delight when 35 years later when I was appointed Rector of The Parish of Templemore and Dean of Derry to find that among my parishioners and still living at Shearwater Way were Maurice and Val Brown. Their daughter Lisa and son Philip had married but Maurice and Val were now parishioners of The Parish of Templemore.

Maurice plays a significant part in the life of the church – as a member of The Select Vestry, as People's Supplemental Glebewarden, as a Bellringer and as a Volunteer Tourist Guide. Val preferred to play a less noticeable part in the life of the church, but has always been a constant support to Maurice and their family.

Val was the fourth of seven children in the McMullan family.

Her siblings were William and Linda (both deceased), Pearl, Roberta, and twins Honor and Hayden.

Her early primary education was at Maydown Primary School.

She later progressed to Faughan Valley Intermediate School where she loved and excelled at Sports, particularly at Netball where she was a member of the First Team.

Val was an attractive young lady and she was encouraged to take part in the Miss Eglinton competition. Against all of the opposition Val was declared the winner!

A dedicated and hard worker all of her life, Val had a number of different occupations and jobs. Her first job that she loved – even when an accident with a coffee machine caused her to lose the tip of her finger – was at XL Stores.

By this time Val had met Maurice Brown; she met him while he was in the Air Force and they were married on 13th December 1966; and family life with two young children Lisa and Philip meant that work at home replaced work at other places for a few years. When Val decided to return to the work place she was very fortunate to secure a job very close to her home in Shearwater Way. She loved working at Clooney Spar and got to know her neighbours and made many close friends during those years. After some time Val decided to enter a different area of work and she found employment as an Examiner at Welch Margetson Shirt Factory, and later as a Supervisor at Glenaden Shirt Factory.

This was a completely different kind of work to that which she had been accustomed, but Val enjoyed the work and the friends that she made.

When the Factory closed Val was fortunate to find employment at Sevenoaks Care Home and it was from here that she retired.

Val was a person who didn't seek the limelight.

She found great enjoyment in caring for her family.

Her wonderful husband Maurice, her children Lisa and Philip, their spouses Patrick and Joanne, and her granddaughters Chloe and Carys.

Val was a person who had a wise head upon her shoulders, and it was to her that members of her family would come to seek a listening ear and good advice when the pressures of life became difficult to bear. The situation was always tinged with a good deal of humour that eased the pain and distress.

In the years of her and Maurice's retirement from the workplace Val and Maurice found great joy and satisfaction in touring, particularly in England and Scotland, in their Camper Van.

Furnished with all that they would need for home comforts they would set off maybe twice a year to visit family members and friends, returning home a month or two later.

Today as we give thanks for Val, we pray for you Maurice and for Lisa and Philip, for Patrick, Joanne, Chloe and Carys, for Pearl, Roberta, Honor and Hayden, and for the families of William and Linda.

We pray that even in this time of sadness you will find hope and continue to thank God for every good and precious memory of your beloved Val.
