The Canon writes.....



Dear Parishioners and Friends

A number of Christian people, and maybe even to some extent ourselves, travel through life impeded by two basic misconceptions. The first is this. If you are faithful to your calling as a follower of Jesus, you will never be perplexed. That is to say, if you are doing your best to live the Christian way of life, you will never get in a tizzy, you will never shed a tear, you will never buckle under pressure, in life you will always have success. The experience, not only of the great heroes of the faith, but also of countless ordinary men and women down the ages, and around us today, blows such notions out of the water as total nonsense. Whatever else it may accomplish, our faith does not render us immune to the hard knocks which are part of the price we pay for being human.

The second misconception is this. Life should always be a bed of roses. Now it is nice when it is a bed of roses, if it ever is for you, but do we really imagine that the idea of life as a bed of roses can be compatible with taking up your cross and following Christ?

Yet somehow, we can easily be subsumed into the dream world concocted by advertisers and persuaders, a world where nothing goes wrong and we don't expect any trouble, a world where fairy tales come true by means of talent, good looks, money and success.

In reality, as we know well, life simply is not like that. Each of us, sooner or later, must grapple with unexpected misfortune, tragedy, illness or bereavement in our own experience or among those dear to us. It is through these harsh realities that the true value of our faith is challenged. The interesting thing is that the Lord we follow does not offer us easy answers or plausible solutions to the situations which perplex us.

Instead, He invites us, as we explore the tapestry of life, to place our trust in Him. Whatever happens "trust in God, trust also in me"

The One who tells us that the hairs of our head are numbered asks us to trust in Him and to realise the extent of his care and concern for each of us. "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground unperceived by your Father. So do not be afraid you are of more value than many sparrows." Throughout the Middle East sparrows were sold in the market places as inexpensive food for the poor. Curiously enough, in Chapter twelve of Saint Luke's Gospel Jesus tells us that five sparrows are sold for two pennies. Why should that be? Well, it would seem that when a man was buying four sparrows, the person who was selling them threw in an extra sparrow for nothing. In other words, the fifth sparrow was of such little value, so worthless and insignificant, that it was simply given away with the other four. Yet the Gospel teaches us that our heavenly Father cares for that one surplus sparrow. What the world regards as disposable and worthless is precious and priceless in the sight of God. So for us the message is clear and comforting. Since we are of more value to God than many sparrows, how much more will he take notice of us in the midst of our troubles, hardship and difficulties! Our trust is in the One who created sparrows and the sunshine of another day.

The Men's Society met on Tuesday 17th February at 7:30pm in the Diocesan Centre and the Rev Canon John Merrick opened the meeting with prayer. The guest speaker for the evening was Mr Ryan McCree, Chairman of the Londonderry Port & Harbour Commissioners and he spoke about his career in the army from the age of 16 and his tours of duty in Iraq and particularly Afghanistan.

The talk was very well-presented, using images and videos to show the realities of frontline war. Ryan described a life unfamiliar to most, which many found astonishing. By the end, members better understood what being a modern soldier involves and how warfare is advancing with new technology. It took almost 10 years after leaving the army to discuss his experiences and said giving talks and presentations on the subject has greatly benefited his mental health.

Our next meeting will be in The Newgate Centre, Kennedy Street and will be on the fourth Tuesday of the month, 24th April, to avoid conflict with St Patrick's Day.

Dear friends at St Columb's Cathedral

Thank you. Your gift of £260.67 is so gladly received, your kindness is transforming lives.

For young people like Satendra (pictured opposite) hope can feel far away. He experienced the early signs of leprosy when he was still in school, but doctors didn't diagnose it correctly. He was sent away with allergy medicine, Satendra's health plummeted. His friends began to tease him and he dropped out of school.



Leprosy was affecting his hands so badly that he could barely hold a pencil.

Discrimination and exclusion took a deep toll on him, and at a point of crisis he took poison, trying to end the pain he felt. Thankfully he was found by a family member and saved. They brought him to Anandaban Hospital in Nepal. There he received the cure to leprosy, but more than that, he also received the help and support to rebuild his life.

Things aren't perfect for Satendra. There is still a long way to go through physio to repair some of the damage, and the time spent away from school cannot be recovered. But thanks to you there was hope when he needed it most. Your support meant that a TLM Hospital was able to cure his leprosy. Your kindness has started Satendra on the road towards healing.

MODERN SLAVERY IS CLOSER THAN YOU THINK

MODERN SLAVERY

Modern slavery is a global crisis that requires urgent action to support victims and bring perpetrators to justice. In Northern Ireland, the number of individuals referred through the National Referral Mechanism has, in recent years increased by 1,000%, highlighting the need to understand the complexities of human trafficking.

Human trafficking is a form of modern slavery where individuals are forced into labour or sexual exploitation through physical, financial, or psychological control. It involves three key elements:

The Act: Recruitment, transfer, harbouring, or receipt of persons.

The Means: Threats, force, abduction, fraud, or the abuse of power and vulnerability.

The Purpose: Exploitation through forced labour, sexual exploitation, servitude, or the removal of organs.

In Northern Ireland, recovery is supported by organisations such as Flourish NI, which provides survivors with long-term care plans addressing material, physical, and psychological needs. Without this specialised support, survivors face severe risks, including social isolation, re-exploitation, homelessness, and mental health issues.

Efforts to combat these crimes are guided by the Human Trafficking and Exploitation (Criminal Justice and Support for Victims) Act (Northern Ireland) 2015. A review of this Act's effectiveness is currently underway, incorporating feedback from frontline organisations such as Flourish NI and Women's Aid.

Eulogy of Bobby Hepburn - 1st February 2026

We are gathered here this afternoon in this family home to support you Bobby's family in this your time of loss, to share in your grief and to give thanks for the life of a much-loved father, grandfather, great-grandfather, brother and friend. Bobby's life can be summarized in one word 'service!' Service of love for his family, his community and his country. Bobby was one of ten children born to David and Matilda Hepburn with the family eventually establishing their lifelong home in Culmore. He was baptized in St. Augustine's Church on the City Walls. He was educated in Christ Church school proceeding from there to Templemore. The family ensured that his formal education was but one part of his nurture and saw to it that his spiritual growth was also cultivated through regular attendance at Sunday School and Church where he was awarded many prizes.

He had a varied employment history starting with a job as a message boy in Pollock's cycling to his work in the city. He often recounted stories about deliveries to Lawrence Hill. Following this he was employed in the Furniture Department at Austin's Stores, within Austins he found himself being moved around Departments to meet the needs in each area of the Store. Part of his training within the Store was being taught how to wrap a parcel. This was followed by a period of employment in Malseed's Supermarket in Rosemount. Sadly, the Troubles had broken out during this time and the shop was subjected to an arson attack while Bobby was within the store.

He joined the Ulster Defence Regiment as a reservist; he later joined the RUC as a part time policeman also holding sown civilian employment as a breadman. Sadly, and shockingly in November 1976 he was shot and gravely injured while delivering bread to Long's Supermarket on the Strand Road.

Following a miraculous and determined recovery he joined the Police as a full-time recruit. He retired after a long and distinguished career in which he was awarded commendations for Good Police Work, Good Conduct Award, Long Service Medal and of course the George Cross Medal awarded to the entire force for their bravery in extreme and dangerous conditions. Sadly, many lost their lives during this sad time. He had a great love and respect for the men and woman he served with and remembered everyone of them fondly.

On the 19th December, 1970 he married Susan McClay in First Derry Presbyterian Church a young woman from the Fountain whom he met and fell in love with immediately, a mutual love that grew stronger with every passing year of the marriage. They spent their honeymoon in a Salvation Army Hostel in Belfast with Susan insisting that they return to Derry after one night as she was embarrassed because everyone realised that they were a newly married couple.

Bobby was a devoted husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather. He would always put his late wife Suan and his children and their children before everything else and continued to do so throughout his entire life. He looked forward to visits from his grandchildren and great grandchildren. In recent years this brought a smile to his face. From an early age he had a passion for motor bikes and cars, he crashed his first motor bike racing down the road with his parents behind him in their car, needless to say his younger brother was not allowed to acquire a motor bike. I understand that his love of speed often saw him in trouble and his family remember that travelling with him in the car could often be a source of butterflies in their stomachs.

Please allow me to quote some words given to me by you his family "We all greatly loved and respected our Daddy. He taught us so much about how to live, how to treat others and a great deal about kindness. He will be remembered for his practical jokes, good advice and loyalty."

Today you are saying an earthly farewell to someone who has meant so much to you, gave so much to you and has left you with so many wonderful memories, you are feeling empty and heartbroken, however, I love the farewell in French "au revoir" which translated means "until I see you again" Bobby had a very strong and confident faith in Jesus Christ and because of this we believe that he is now in the nearer presence of his Lord

and Saviour and through the death, resurrection and ascension of our Lord we know that one day we will be reunited with those whom we know and loved in this life yet see no longer. I want to say to you Terry, Roberta, Linda, Kingsley, Georgia your families and in particular, Bobby Lee, Philip, Clayton, Travis, Melissa their families particularly Emi Rose, Ryla, Luella, Robin, Holly and Harry, to Bobby's siblings and many friends hold fast to that great Christian truth, believe in it, practice it and through it you will receive the strength and courage to come through these sad days. Of Bobby we say may he rest in peace and be raised in glory.

Eulogy of Sarah Kathleen Hughes - 9th February 2026

We are gathered here today in this Cathedral Church of St Columb to give thanks for the life and witness of Sarah Kathleen Hughes, of equal importance we have come here today to support you Kathleen's family in your sorrow and sadness as you prepare to say an earthly farewell to a greatly loved wife, mother, mother – in – law, grandmother, great-grandmother, sister and friend. Sadly, some members of Kathleen's family are unable to be with us today and we extend our sympathy to you as you join us on line for this Service of Thanksgiving.

Kathleen passed away quietly on Friday afternoon in the care of the amazing Staff in the Foyle Hospice with her immediate family at her bedside. Kathleen's passing brought to a close a protracted illness which she bore with great fortitude, courage and dignity. Kathleen was born on the 28th December 1946, one of seven children born to Herbert and Martha Norris. Her siblings are Deidre, Sandra, Pamela and Heather she was predeceased by her brothers David and Joe. She was born at 24 Fountain Place and grew up there. She began her formal education in Carlisle Road Primary School proceeding from there to Templemore Secondary School where she excelled both academically and on the sports field. Her faith life was nurtured in Waterside Presbyterian Church augmented by her membership of the Girl's Choir in this Cathedral Church.

Terry's first introduction to Kathleen was seeing her on the bus as they travelled to school. They met when Kathleen came to work at David Irvine's Printers, Waterloo Street where Terry had just begun his apprenticeship while Kathleen was a paper worker in the firm's Bookbinding Department. Romance blossomed and they were married in Waterside Presbyterian Church on 20th November 1965, celebrating sixty years of marriage a few months ago. The family moved to Belfast in search of employment returning eventually to the City in 1975. They both found employment with the Civilian Search Unit, sadly a part of the necessary security facility in the City at that time. Kathleen moved to the Health Service as a Domestic Supervisor. A nurse in the Hospice remembered Kathleen with great fondness describing her as an 'excellent Supervisor'. She followed this employment moving to Maydown Ebrington Group where she enjoyed her interaction with the elderly clients. Her final employment was with City Centre Initiative as a City Centre Ranger retiring from this role in 2010. This role involved meeting with business owners, the public, and tourists. It was during this time that I got to know Kathleen, I was immediately impressed as I witnessed her amazing insight and knowledge of the City and more importantly it's people. She was an ambassador 'par excellence'

Retirement saw Kathleen using this period of her life to spend more time and get lovingly involved in the life of her family and in particular her grandchildren. She loved knitting and crocheting and baking. She produced hats and jumpers for everyone and I'm sure the tins in her kitchen were worth raiding.

Kathleen was a very astute and observant lady. On one occasion she witnessed a man, in suspicious circumstances, interfering with a car parked near her car, thinking he was breaking into the car, she returned to find that he had planted a bomb under the car. She ran to the police Station in Spencer Road and raised the alarm. She returned with the Police and proceeded to get into her own car with the Police pleading with her not to do so to which she replied "It's the only car we've got" and drove off. She refused to be the recipient of a Bravery Award for her courage on that occasion as she feared for the welfare of her family.

At a personal level she loved music her favourite performers were George Michael, Fleetwood Mac and the Eagles.

At the beginning of this service you heard me read the words "I am the resurrection and the life" says the Lord 'Those who believe in me, even though they die yet shall they live and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die' because of this promise from Christ himself, we know that while you Kathleen's family today have hearts and minds overflowing with loss and sadness, this is not an end. There is no finality in today's events. We know and believe that through the death, resurrection and ascension of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ one day we will be reunited with those whom we knew and loved in this life yet see no longer. Please be assured that Kathleen is now in the nearer presence of her Creator God and Saviour Jesus Christ. Hold fast to this Christian truth; a truth that has been real source of comfort to families and individuals as they come to terms with the realization that a loved one is no longer in their midst. Today we extend our heartfelt sympathy and support to you Terry to you Moira, Brian and Gareth to your spouse's Peter and Lisa, the grandchildren Edward, Simon, Katherine, Sam and Evie great grandchildren Ida, Heidi, and Hana also Kathleen's siblings Deidre, Sandra, Pamela and Heather, I conclude with a line from George Michael's lyric, Kathleen's favourite artist 'I think there's something you should know, I think its time I stopped the show!'


