One of the Scripture readings appointed for A Service at Harvest is Saint Luke 17: 11-19 -

(Jesus heals ten men who have leprosy).

You might wonder why this story was chosen and what it has to do with Harvest.

In this story we read that ten men came to Jesus asking Him to heal them of their illness – the dreaded skin disease, leprosy. Because of it they could not work, they had no family life, their friends and neighbours avoided them.

They came to Jesus with a request, "Please, help us".

Jesus healed all of those men but only one man came back to say "Thank You".

This was something that Jesus noticed and commented on.

The words "Thank You" should be loud and clear in all of our Harvest celebrations and services.

We come as "thankful people" to worship God and to thank Him for the blessings of the Harvest – and for so much more.

God is the Provider of all that we need in order to live. He is the Sustainer, the one who continues to bless our lives in the good times and in the bad times.

The point that we sometimes forget is that all that we have and all that we are is from a generous God.

Two small words, "Thank You", but words that are filled with so much meaning. While Harvest gives us the opportunity to say "Thank You" to God it also gives us the opportunity to remember other people, particularly those who, for whatever reasons, have not been as blessed as we have been.

This year, the Harvest celebrations direct our thoughts and actions to Foyle Food Bank in this City. We have the opportunity to support the good work that it does by donating non-perishable food items for the use of individuals and families who are finding it difficult to maintain a normal life-style because of unemployment or the high cost of living. God has been generous to us. Let us be generous to others.

Included in a generous response to the needs of other people is an opportunity to support the people of Libya who have suffered because of the catastrophic flooding in that country a while ago.

Through Bishops' Appeal for World Aid and Development's disaster appeal we can reach out in love to our brothers and sisters in Christ.

God has blessed us with so much. What He has given to us should not be kept to ourselves selfishly, but we must share what we have and what we can afford with those who are in need.

In the just reward of labour, God's will is done, in the help we give our neighbour, God's will is done: in our world-wide task of caring for the hungry and despairing; in the harvests we are sharing, God's will is done.

# **BISHOPS' APPEAL**

Archbishop John McDowell and Archbishop Michael Jackson are encouraging parishioners throughout The Church of Ireland to contribute to Bishops' Appeal for World Aid and Development's disaster appeal in response to the recent catastrophic flooding in Libya. 4,000 people are known to have died, 9,000 people are missing and 37,000 people have been displaced by the storm.

Bishops' Appeal has already released £10,000 in Emergency Aid from its reserves and all monies raised by the appeal will be additional funds to help with the disaster relief. In response to this information, a retiring offering will be held at all services on Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> October (and on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> October) for Bishops' Appeal in support of the people of Libya. 

# **American Flag**

The American flag which had been laid up in the Cathedral in c1945, and which hung for many vears in the South side of the main aisle, had deteriorated beyond repair and spent its last years in the Cabinet at the top of the South aisle. The flag had 48 stars – this was before the last two States, Hawaii and Alaska, joined the Union in 1959 bringing the total to 50. It was obviously difficult now to source a flag with 48 stars, but this was achieved by Ted and Sandra Malcor who live part of the year in the US. (Ted is a former US Navy serviceman who was stationed in the (now closed) American base in Londonderry). Sandra (nee Dougherty) and Ted very kindly donated the flag to the Cathedral, but the former flagpole is too long and has to be shortened. A plaque will be erected in due course.



### MISSION FOCUS - THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF UGANDA

For many people in Uganda, owning a Bible is a luxury that they cannot afford. They must first provide food, shelter and medicine for their families, meaning that they cannot justify the cost of purchasing Scripture.

The Bible Society of Uganda is working to meet this need by providing free Bibles to those who cannot afford their own, after hearing reports from churches across Uganda that Christians did not have access to them.

# **Obituary** ....

# Albert Alexander Plews 28<sup>th</sup> March 1947 – 5<sup>th</sup> September 2023

We have come here today to remember our dear brother Albert, to give thanks for his life, to leave him in the keeping of God his creator, redeemer and judge, to commit his body to be buried, and to comfort one another in our grief, in the hope that is ours through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

I began a funeral address with words very similar to these in this very place only thirteen days ago. We had come to remember Albert's wife Margaret, and Albert was sitting in the front listening to every word. I spoke with him in hospital on last Friday afternoon and he said that while he had found the service emotional he had also found it helpful. I told him that he was a brave man – leaving the warmth of his hospital ward where he had spent six weeks and even venturing to Ballyoan Cemetery and dealing with a heavy shower of rain. I find it hard to believe that today, less than two weeks later, we are here again – many of the same people – this time to pay our respects to Albert and to give thanks for his life. Albert was born on 28<sup>th</sup> March 1947 at 33 Fountain Place, Londonderry. He was the fifth of six children born to William Cecil and Mary Logue Plews.

His siblings were Billy, Jarvis, Edith, John and Trevor.

Albert was baptised in Saint Columb's Cathedral on 18<sup>th</sup> May 1947 by The Reverend James Henry Kermode.

His early education was at The Cathedral Schools and his early Christian formation was in the Cathedral where he had been baptised and where later he would be a Chorister, and where, later still, he would marry Margaret on 26<sup>th</sup> June 1976.

Albert's father William Cecil Plews was a Railway Shunter and this may have been one of the reasons why Albert followed that line of employment. He became a train driver based at Waterside Station.

At some time Albert moved from this city to live in Scotland, returning home in about 1997. New avenues of employment beckoned and Albert began work at The Inn on the Cross (now the Belfray) and then he moved to The White Horse Hotel at Campsie where he was a faithful employee as a porter for fifteen years, retiring only three years ago at the age of 73. In his early years growing up in the sight of Saint Columb's Cathedral Albert had been a Cathedral Chorister, and I am informed that even as he matured in years he continued to have a good singing voice, enjoying Karaoke and Jiving!

Albert had a love for pigeons and often came first in competitions when he lived in Scotland. We have all known that Albert's health – and particularly during the past eight weeks – has not been good and there have been times when his family thought that they were going to lose him.

Albert's life here on earth has now ended and while his demise had been expected one always hoped that he would be spared for one more day.

I suspect that the death of his beloved Margaret may have led, in part, to his own death. We have all heard the saying, "He / She died of a broken heart".

Albert and Margaret had been together as husband and wife for 47 years. Today, they are reunited in the home that has been prepared for them in Heaven.

In the place where pain and suffering are no more.

Where physical disabilities are unknown and where everyone is safe because God is watching over them.

Today, we are sad as we say 'Goodnight' to Albert but we hold on to the divine promise that one day in God's own time we will see Albert and Margaret once again. On that day our joy will be complete because the circle of life that has been broken by death will be complete. Today as we commend Albert to the safe resting place of His heavenly Father's presence we echo the words of Saint Paul: "I thank my God every time I remember you".


