# Dear Parishioners and Friends

Sitting as I often do on a Sunday morning or afternoon, and at other times too, in the Vestibule of Saint Columb's Cathedral I am conscious of two eminent figures looking down on me.

One is Saint Columba, the Patron Saint of The Dioceses of Derry and Raphoe.

The other is Saint Patrick, the Patron Saint of Ireland.

The Dean

Many scholars - including the late Archbishop George Otto Simms in a little booklet 'Commemorating Saints and Others of the Irish Church' – indicate that there were three patrons saints of Ireland. Patrick and Columba and one other. Who is this one other and why is he/she not recognised and commemorated in our Diocesan Cathedral? The saint who is missing is Brigid, the Abbess of Kildare, whose Feast Day is celebrated on 1<sup>st</sup> February.

Archbishop George Simms writes that Brigid was regarded as the second patron saint of Ireland. And it is important to note that her earthly remains are interred alongside those of Patrick and Columba in Downpatrick.

Some facts are known about Brigid but the lack of any writings by her has led to many stories and legends.

We know that Brigid was born at Faughart, County Louth in 452. Her father Dubhtach was a chieftain in Leinster. Her mother Briocsech (Brocca) was a slave and a Christian who came to faith through Saint Patrick's preaching of the Gospel.

Brigid founded a monastery under an oak tree in Kildare (Cill Dara - the church of the oak). This monastery quickly grew to become a full-scale monastic community for both men and women.

It was attended by many people who studied religion, writing and art.

As the head of a community that became Ireland's centre of learning, Brigid was an important leader in the ancient world and in the Church. She assumed the role of bishop — an unusual position for a woman in fifth-century Ireland.

An eighth-century text "Life of St Brigid" claims that her ordination was actually an accident and that, while receiving her nun's veil, the bishop (St Mel of Longford) read the wrong passage from his book, thereby consecrating Brigid as a bishop.

Brigid was a bishop in all but name and is always depicted with a crozier to which she would have been entitled as an abbess of the double monastery in Kildare that she oversaw with the aid of Conleth. (Reference 'Through The Year with the Irish Saints' by Stella Durand). Brigid died in 524. This means that we commemorate the 1500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of her death this year.

The Republic of Ireland has set aside the Feast Day of Saint Brigid (1<sup>st</sup> February) as a public holiday and many civic and church events will be held in the County and Diocese of Kildare this year.

Apart from within the Diocese of Kildare, of which Brigid is the patron saint, very little recognition is given to her ministry as a bishop from The Church of Ireland as a whole. Perhaps, in this significant year this omission could be addressed and Brigid could be given her rightful place alongside Patrick and Columba and be remembered not only in the Diocese of Kildare but throughout the whole of Ireland.

#### **MU Making a Difference - Spotlight on Burundi**

Burundi is one of the world's poorest countries and faces immense challenges, still suffering from the effects of a civil war that lasted 12 years (1993-2005). This conflict devasted communities, disrupted family relationships, interrupted access to education and exacerbated gender disparities.

The Mothers' Union Burundi Literacy and Financial Programme has been running since 2000 to combat poverty, promote gender equality and women's empowerment. This transformational programme has so far assisted:

165,400 participants, of whom 77% were women, have benefited from the programme 144,000 people, of whom 89% were women, have learnt to read and write to a nationally approved standard through this community-led programme, enriching their lives and empowering their communities.

6,200 savings and loan associations have been mobilised.

"The programme is life changing... it gives you a new (lease of) life. We have learnt to read and write so it has opened our eyes. We make money and can feed and clothe ourselves and our children. We have bought land and have built our own houses. We (women) have become the light of our families." A Mothers' Union leader from the Diocese of Matana, Burundi.

We had visitors from all over the city and people travelling by train, bus and car from all parts of the


province, with all

#### THE REVISION OF THE LIST OF REGISTERED VESTRYPERSONS

A Meeting of the Select Vestry of The Parish of Templemore will be held in Cathedral House, No 1 St Columb's Court on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> February 2024 at 7.30 p.m.

One of the items on the Agenda will be The Revision of the List of Registered Vestrypersons.

At the meeting the name of any parishioner who has died, or who has left the parish, during the year will be deleted and, hopefully, new names will be added.

Any resident parishioner or accustomed member of the congregation who is eighteen years of age and over may have his/her name added to the List provided that he/she fulfils the following requirements.

Signs a declaration form that he/she is a member of The Church of Ireland. Is either a resident parishioner or an accustomed member of the congregation.

Declaration forms will be available in the Cathedral during the month of January. Please ask the churchwardens (Morris Forbes and Muriel Hamilton) for details.

Q. What is the List of Registered Vestryperson?

A. The List of Registered Vestrypersons is the list of the names of parishioners and of people who are accustomed members of the congregation, ie. people who 'belong' to the parish but who live outside of the parish boundaries.

It is from this list that people are appointed and elected at the meeting of The General Vestry, ie. The Annual Meeting of the Parish, held usually after Easter, to serve as churchwardens, glebewardens and members of the Select Vestry.

- Q. To what will I be committing myself if I sign the Declaration Form?
- A. By having your name on the list you will be doing two things.
- (1) You will be entitled to nominate, and elect, parishioners to various offices, and
- (2) you will be able if you wish to be nominated for office yourself.

If you have never signed a Declaration Form, or have forgotten that you signed many, many years ago, we can check the List for you.

### Jeannie (Jean) Pomeroy 8<sup>th</sup> March 1934 - 5<sup>th</sup> December 2023

I don't know about you, but when I think of Jean Pomeroy, my mind's eye takes me to a lady who was unassuming in character, impeccably dressed, well turned out, hair always sitting to perfection, sparkling eyes, a warm smile, a healthy glow - due (in part at least) to her many holidays in the sun. A lady who was energetic and sociable, a good friend, an avid reader, an active bowler, (indeed a champion bowler!), and fully involved in all the various musical and artist activities in the Woman's Institute and the U3A. I know, of course, that Jean's health had deteriorated somewhat in recent times, but that was certainly the Jean I knew over the last forty or so years, and I think most here can relate to that picture of her. Life for Jeannie McCauley began on the 8<sup>th</sup>March 1934, and she was the second child in the household, with an older brother Billie who passed away in 2020, and a younger sister Hazel. Jean was brought up in the Rosemount area – Lewis Street to be precise, and when she was a child, her father served in the army.

Jean attended The Model Primary School, walking to school via Brooke Park; and then upon finishing primary school she went to secretarial school with the renowned Miss Loughery. It was there that Jean learnt the skills which enabled her to get her first job – and that was no mean fete, because apparently Jean wasn't with Miss Loughry all of the time, because she reportedly skipped the odd class to see her beloved husband to be, Will, whom she met on the evening of 11<sup>th</sup> July 1950 on bonfire night in the Fountain. Romance blossomed, and although there is some ambiguity over who chased whom the most, Jean would later have said that that night, she met her soulmate. The young happy couple were married in Great James' Street Presbyterian Church in June of 1955 when Jean was just 21 years old. They honeymooned in the Isle of Man, and then began their married life living with Jean's parents, before purchasing their first home in Rosemount Avenue. After about six years, Jean and Will started their own family, three sons – Philip, Allister and Grahame. With all three boys being under the age of three, you can imagine that Jean had her hands full to say the least. Although she was mild natured, Jean had exacting standards, and a look from their mum would leave the boys in no doubt that something had displeased her. They occasionally liked to remind Jean of the time she called upon Will to exercise some control ..... poor Jean felt guilty about this event until she found out some years later what really happened -Will rolled up a newspaper and told the boys to cry out as he hit his own hand with it! Eventually Jean and her family decided it was time to leave Rosemount and relocate to the Waterside – they moved initially to Cherryburn Gardens, then to Deanfield, Judges Road and in retirement downsized to the bungalow at Grovemount. In the intervening years, Jean worked in Longs at Woodburn, the stores at Gransha and then took up a position in medical records which she held until she took early retirement in her mid-fifties. She enjoyed her working life and made many good friends. In the midst of this, Will also had secured a senior position within the Trust, and I know Jean was a great support to him not only in his demanding professional role but also in the pursuit of his various hobbies which included banding and golf.

In the fullness of time, Jean's family circle grew as she welcomed daughters in law and then grandchildren and of course great grandchildren. I know that Jean was very proud of her family, and I know also that she loved them dearly, and was loved dearly in return. It was a tremendous blow to everyone in the family when Grahame passed away at the beginning of 2021, and this sad loss was something which, naturally enough, troubled Jean greatly. Despite this however, she was very thankful for the happier memories she had of family times together, not least travelling to Hongkong to be with Grahame and Adelle. In fact, talking about Jean's travels and holidays was one of the little strategies the staff in Deanfield employed if she ever became a little bit down.

Will and Jean did indeed travel extensively, quite often with Hazel and Raymond. Cruises, the Mediterranean and, if I remember rightly, Santa Ponsa got more than it's fair share of visits – all a fair step up from the family holidays in the boys' younger years which were usually to Portrush, Dun Laoghaire or Arklow.

In terms of her Christian faith, Jean was raised a presbyterian (which was no doubt something that was the subject of the odd joke from Will); but after they were married Jean attended St. Columb's Cathedral and although Cathedral style worship took a little bit of getting used to, she became a faithful and loyal parishioner. Church was an important part of Jean's routine, and when she developed back problems which made it difficult to sit through the principal morning service, she attended the early morning Holy Communion service instead. She and Will enjoyed continued contact with their church through visitations from the Dean and Canon Merrick, and I know it is a matter of regret for both of them that neither were able to be here to conduct Jean's funeral service this afternoon. Notwithstanding that, I know the entire family circle remain firmly in their prayers.

In the last few years, Jean's health dipped quite a little bit and she was very well cared for by Will, by the wider family circle and also by the carers who would have assisted them in Grovemount. Just under two years ago, Jean and Will made the decision to move to Deanfield, and I know that the family would like me to express, on their behalf, a word of thanks to all those who looked after Jean so attentively over the last few years. Sadly, for those who were closest to Jean, her earthly pilgrimage came to a peaceful end as she slipped away in the small hours of Tuesday morning, with Will by her side. And so, as we give thanks to God for Jean, we recall fondly all the various aspects of her life, but most of all we're thankful for the ways in which her life touched everyone else's .... a loving wife and mother, devoted grandmother and greatgrandmother, a family member, a special friend and neighbour. And hopefully in the midst of these memories and as we say our goodbyes to Jean, we will also draw some comfort in the fact that she had a long and fulfilling life, and that now she is at rest in the nearer presence of God. **Amen.** 

# Werner Scheel 31<sup>st</sup> December 1943 – 15<sup>th</sup> December 2023

We meet on this afternoon in The Cathedral Church of Saint Columb to thank Almighty God for Werner Scheel, to remember his life, his contribution to this church and parish and to society, and to give thanks for the friendship and fellowship that we enjoyed with him. We have heard John McCrossan speak about Werner and his contribution to this City through 40 years association with The Rotary Club of Londonderry. His association with Rotary was much more than a passing association. His involvement was at every level and it made a real difference in so many ways to this City and its people.

Werner's family have shared their memories with me and it would be foolish of me to try to edit their thoughts or to incorporate them into my Address. So, let me read what they have written. They knew him so much better than I ever could.

And I will now read a short message sent today from Werner's brother Gunther in Germany. And now let me add some thoughts from the perspective of this parish and Cathedral. While health permitted Werner was a regular attender at worship services. He played an active part in the life of this church, serving as a member of the Select Vestry from 2020-2022, and also being a member of The Men's Society.

Werner liked to keep myself and Canon John updated on his health issues and as recently as July he emailed us with detailed information about how his health had deteriorated. He always hoped that his next email would bring better news.

On Christmas Eve of last year we received an email apologising that he would not be at any of the services over Christmas – because he and members of his family would be spending Christmas in Portrush, and he added that he was aiming to be back in the Cathedral on New Year's Day.

So, like so many other people our memories are personal and we, too, are going to miss Werner as a parishioner and as a friend.

He was always so appreciative of the ministry of myself and of Canon John, especially when he was a patient in Althagelvin Hospital.

As we approach Christmas we are reminded that in many ways this is a time for joy; a time when families meet together and enjoy each other's company. It is a time to spend valuable time together.

And yet we are acutely aware that for many people across the world Christmas can often be a sad time of the year. It is a time to which they do not look forward, due to financial pressures and the absence of loved family members who shared Christmasses in years past.

As you come to terms with the death of Werner, it is obvious from what has been shared with us that Werner would want you to celebrate his life; to hold on to cherished memories; and to remember the many good times that you shared with each other over a long number of years.

At Christmas we read of many words or names associated with Jesus.

One of my favourite names is Emmanuel.

This name means 'God is with us'.

And it reminds us that whatever we face in life, whatever trials come our way, we never have to face difficult times alone.

God is with us. He comes to us in the person of His Son, Jesus.

But we can find God and His reassuring presence in other places and people too.

Within the family of the Church; and I hope that in whatever place you worship you will find a welcome, a listening ear, a sympathetic voice.

God speaks to us in many different ways and we can find His presence and His love in the people whom we meet. Those who stand alongside us in those difficult times such as you are facing today.

So, in all of these ways - through the compassion of God, the presence of Jesus and the support of family, neighbours and friends I hope that you will remain steadfast and resolute on this day and in the days that lie ahead for you.

# Aubrey Dukes Fielding M.B.E. 27<sup>th</sup> December 1931 – 16<sup>th</sup> January 2024

The surname 'Fielding' is synonymous with The Parish of Templemore and Saint Columb's Cathedral.

The Fielding name has appeared in the Cathedral records for over 100 years.

And when we mention the name of Aubrey Fielding it would take quite a number of hours to allow us to talk about all of the aspects of Cathedral, City and Community life in which Aubrey was engaged during the last 92 years.

**Aubrey Dukes Fielding** was born on 27<sup>th</sup> December 1931.

He was the fourth of six sons born to George Fielding of Dublin and Florence Henderson of Kilskeery. His parents lived at 116 Fountain Street, Londonderry.

Aubrey's siblings were Arthur, George, John, Raymond and Maurice.

Aubrey was baptised in this Cathedral Church on 13<sup>th</sup> March 1932

by The Reverend David Joseph McClure, the Curate-assistant.

From a very early age Saint Columb's Cathedral Choir played a significant part in the life of Aubrey and of his brothers, and later in the life of his four sons.

At one time all six brothers were members of the Choir at the same time.

When Aubrey was 5 years old he approached the Organist,

Mr John T Frankland, to be enrolled. Mr Frankland asked him, "Are you married?" and then told Aubrey to come back when he was.

This did not deter Aubrey and he was admitted as a chorister on 10<sup>th</sup> January 1938 (86 years ago).

He served under ten organists and could relate many stories about each one of them.

He moved from the Boys' Choir when he was 18 years old and became an Alto in the Men's Choir.

When he retired from the Choir he had served as an Alto for 72 years and 9 months.

What a record! Another area of Cathedral life in which Aubrey was engaged for much of his life was Bell Ringing. He joined the team of bell ringers in 1948.

It was obvious that he was a competent ringer and was enrolled on 26<sup>th</sup> March 1951.

Up until a few weeks ago – 75 years later - Aubrey was still ringing the bells.

During his time 37 people were trained by Aubrey – some were able to master the technique and others just did not have the skills or the determination to continue.

For services to bell ringing in Northern Ireland, Aubrey was awarded the M.B.E.

And perhaps one of his proudest moments in recent times was ringing the Cathedral bells for the service to mark the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III on 5<sup>th</sup> May 2023.

He was delighted to have been interviewed on that occasion for the national media.

Aubrey was a founder member of the Cathedral Men's Society and was its Treasurer for many years; also enjoying the occasional outings and Breakfasts and Dinners during the year.

Aubrey was a member of the first 'Young People's Vestry' in the Cathedral and served as churchwarden for a year.

Another proud moment was when he was commissioned as a Parish Reader and would assist at Choral Matins and Choral Eucharist.

He would also read the Daily Office on Thursday and Friday morning.

In this ministry he was a great help to me and to the previous Deans.

In 1987, on the death of Sydney Haslett, Aubrey took up a post in The Derry Rural Deanery Youth Project where he continued into the Millennium putting the Cathedral Records of Births, Marriages and Deaths onto computer and creating a database.

He became very competent in this work and got to know a lot of people who contacted him seeking information about their family history. 37 years later, his initial work continues to bring family history alive for many people.

I know that another area of parish life in which he played a very active part was in the Church Savings Scheme. This scheme, now long closed, encouraged many families and individuals to save, and Aubrey's involvement was a key part of this.

Aubrey was a life-long member of this Parish and he had a great love for this Cathedral and would often put someone half his age to shame. I was privileged to assist him with cleaning and tidying the Chancel a few months ago and whenever I looked around he was away to the Basement Toilets with flower holders and oasis.

His particular task when it came to a major cleaning of the Cathedral in preparation for some important services was to polish the 250 pew heads. I can still see him polishing the pew heads with 'wood silk' polish.

Aubrey's life story shows that he was a very busy man, involved and interested in so many different aspects of life in this Cathedral and City.

Outside of Cathedral life he was an active member of St John Ambulance Brigade in the 1950's. A member of the Cathedral Cub Pack and Scouts.

A keen supporter of Everton Football team.

He also played hockey for the Cathedral teams and remembers tough opposition on the pitch from – believe it or not – members of the clergy team!

He was a local runner and ran in various Northern Ireland events.

It is good to note that his grandson Christopher is following in his footsteps and we wish Christopher well in his forthcoming endeavours for Northern Ireland later this month. Another important part of Aubrey's busy life was his association with Londonderry Probus

for which he was awarded a lifelong membership on his 90<sup>th</sup> birthday.

His involvement with City life found him on the Board of Directors of Derry Youth and Community Workshop; and he also was a volunteer since 2005 in Foyle Child Contact Centre. Aubrey had a good circle of friends, including James Stewart who collected him for Probus meetings on a Wednesday morning; and Robert McGonigle who collected him on a Friday morning for coffee and a scone when they 'sorted out' the affairs of the world, the city and the Cathedral!

Another of Aubrey's pleasures was to 'go for a wee run' to enjoy the coffee and refreshments in many of the cafes. A popular destination would be Muff Glen or Three Trees in Lough Foyle where he would look out for red squirrels or ringed plovers.

His interest in nature and bird life was also closer to home with his own blackbirds in his garden that reacted favourably to his voice.

Aubrey, although 92 years old, was very much young at heart.

He had a spritely step and only for the misfortune of his heart attack a short while ago he would, I believe, have been entertaining us with stories and fellowship for some years to come.

To return to the beginning of Aubrey's life story:

He received his early primary education at the Cathedral Schools with Mr Beattie and when it came to him leaving school he was sent to Miss Loughrey's classes for a shorthand and typing course.

He gained employment as a trainee shirt cutter in McIntyre, Hogg and Marsh City Factory. He later moved to Hogg and Mitchells' Shirt Factory, eventually becoming Manager at Rosemount Factory.

When I visited Aubrey in hospital on last Friday it was fascinating listening to him recalling his working experience in the shirt factories of this City.

It was in Hogg and Mitchell's Shirt Factory that Aubrey caught the eye of a young lady named Elizabeth. To all of you we express our sympathy on the death of a much loved husband, father, father-in-law and grandfather.


I know that you will have many memories of Aubrey and I hope that they will bring you comfort in the days that lie ahead.
